### ACTION AT LAST!

### Crossing campaign gets real results

A petition which over 100 people signed to stop cars jumping red lights on Caversham Road will result in some action.

Simon Reynolds and Barbara Kendall of the Bell Tower Community Association presented the case to the Road Traffic Advisory Panel at the Reading Borough Council Civic Suite.

The panel agreed to assess the problem for themselves, so commissioned some studies to take place during November and December 2006. The results that came back from that study indicated that visibility was the main issue and not speed, and this has led the council to take the following actions:

 Road markings at both crossings will be repainted

- Both road crossings will have a new anti-skid surface which will highlight the approach to them
- Both crossings will have improved lighting
- The crossing opposite the 'Moderation' public house will have the overhead lights moved so that they are more visible to traffic approaching from the Caversham Bridge direction.

The Bell Tower Community Association has also asked if the time allowed for crossing could be increased, but this has not yet been confirmed. These steps will be put in place very soon and we wait to see if these have had any effect. It will then be up to us all to see if this works. If not, please contact Simon or Christine at 2 Newport Road or speak to any committee member, and we will talk with the traffic panel again!

The Association would like to thank Simon and Barbara for presenting the case, councillor Tony Page for his continued support, and not forgetting Christine Reynolds without whom this action would not be taking place.

#### Meet the new vicar



We welcome Catharine Morris, who has been in charge at New Hope since last November. Neighbourhood News met her recently.

Where were you before? My last parish was on the edge of Newport, in South Wales, with beautiful hills around it. Although now part of the city, it was originally a village and is still a very well-defined community.

What drew you to Reading? I've lived in Reading before, and I felt God's calling to come back. I was also attracted to leading a church like New Hope and the kind of work it does, with the support of Greyfriars behind it.

Is this parish very different from what you're used to? In some ways it's surprisingly similar; in particular, the school in my last parish was small, like E P Collier. The main differences are that this area is much more multicultural and people come and go more frequently.

What are the challenges working in an urban parish like this one? People's disparate lives, long commutes and lack of time make it difficult to get together and establish a real sense of community.

What part do you see New Hope playing in the community in this area? I would like New Hope to be at the heart of the community, providing things not usually found - a place people feel they can come to, full of life, and a place of relationship.



## Help us clean up the graffiti!

You will have probably noticed that the amount of graffiti in our area has increased dramatically in the last few months. We are not alone - this reflects the state of affairs across Reading and indeed across many areas of the country. It just seems that graffiti is in fashion at present, with young people even posting videos of their efforts on the internet and having competitions to see who can get their 'art' into the most inaccessible places.

The Bell Tower Community Association has started a campaign to eradicate the graffiti in our area. We have been endeavouring to track down all the owners of property affected by graffiti and now that spring is approaching we have an opportunity to start cleaning it up. We will attempt to control graffiti in several ways:

- The council is committed to removing graffiti on public property such as road signs free of charge
- Where the graffiti is on painted surfaces such as garage doors it is much easier to paint over the graffiti. We are happy to help with repainting if the property owner gives us permission and provides the paint.
- We now have a do-it-yourself graffiti cleaning kit, which is suitable for small areas up to about 2 square feet. Apparently this works best in warm weather, so we hope to be out cleaning up small graffiti in the spring when the weather permits.
- Virgin Media (formerly NTL) have supplied us with green paint for their cabinets.
- Large areas of graffiti on walls are still a problem. The council can remove these but at present this service is chargeable for private properties. We are still discussing this with the council.

Drew's Ironmongers in Caversham Road have kindly agreed to sponsor us by providing materials.

So all we need now is a few volunteers! You can help us by volunteering to clean graffiti using the DIY kit or paint over it if it is on a painted surface. Unless the graffiti is on your own property please don't, of course, attempt to clean it yourself without contacting us. In many cases we are already talking to the property owner about removal.
