Rev David Nyirongo: from Basra to Bell Tower

The Rev David Nyrongo's path to becoming community missioner at New Hope should have been a direct one, given that his father was a clergyman, but he took the scenic route

"God has a funny sense of humour," he said.

David is originally from Kabwe, a mining town 87 miles north of the Zambian capital, Lusaka.

He arrived in the UK in 2000 to work as a volunteer for CSV, founded by Lord Levy, now called Volunteering Matters. The programme involved young people from both at home and people helping abroad with mental disabilities and health problems. He did that for a year, but afterwards was unsure what he wanted to do with his life when he was introduced to a Ghanaian who was serving in the British Army. It came as a shock to him that a Ghanaian was serving in the UK armed forces, but after talking to him, he signed up.

Military route to priesthood

During his four and a half years in Royal Logistics Corps, the army saw where David's talents lay. They told him he was more of a priest than a soldier, and during a stint in Basra in Iraq he was asked by a chaplain to help out as a Eucharistic assistant. While to outsiders this may seem unusual, the army's assessment came as no surprise to David.

"Even within me I had this calling, but I was running from it. I didn't want to be a priest because I saw all the burdens my father had to carry," he said.

On his return to England, David began the laborious process of applying to become a Church of England vicar, which included eight months of interviews. He has now been ordained for 11 years.

Community Missioner

After a series of posts as an interim vicar, he applied for the post of community missioner at New Hope as part of the team of clergy at Greyfriars. He originally turned down an interview because he did not feel he would have much of a chance at a big church such as Greyfriars. He was offered a posting in Coventry, which he said did not feel right for him so he went back to Greyfriars to say he would come for an interview if they had not yet filled the post.

Asked what a community missioner does, David explained that a vicar is a priest with a parish, which his why he reports to the vicar of Greyfriars. The role of community missioner is to be a presence in the community by making the space at New Hope available to the community. As part of this community rôle, David said, the church is supporting Ukrainian refugees and is continuing to look for ways to help them get back on their feet.


