The guest speaker at this year's Bell Tower AGM was Tony Stead of the Cholsey and Wallingford Railway, our nearest heritage railway.

We chose a railway theme because 2025 marks the 200th anniversary of the inauguration of the Stockton and Darlington Railway, the world's first steam-powered, public railway.

Tony explained how the railway's impecunious beginnings as a Johnny-come-lately to the iron road in 1862-64 came about due to the historic town of Wallingford feeling left out after it was bypassed by the Great Western Railway. The line was at first doubly isolated from the GWR in that it was standard gauge as opposed to the GWR's broad gauge and started at Moulsford with no direct connection to the mainline.

The GWR took over its struggling neighbour in 1872. To make way for the quadrupling of the main line the single track from Moulsford was closed and a new station built and Cholsey, with the Wallingford branch

running into a bay platform there as it does now.

Tony illustrated his talk with images and anecdotes from the line's history, including a stationmaster pranking a junior clerk by pretending to be a circus owner wanting to move the whole circus, including the giraffe from Wallingford. The branch was also used to stable Churchill's train during World War II as well as the Royal Train right up until closure in 1981 by British Rail. Another of its claims to fame is that it was used for publicity shoot for introduction of the HSTs (Intercity 125s). The final closure followed the end of passenger services in 1959, the closure of the original Wallingford station in 1965 and the termination of the line at the ABM Maltings, the site of the present-day station.
