G-Team cleans up 100th graffiti eyesore

A BAND of volunteers dedicated to wiping clean the graffiti menace have celebrated their first milestone.

The self-styled 'G-Team', hailing from the Bell Tower Community Association, cleaned up their 100th illegal daubing this week.

Team leader David Neale who embraced The Reading Chronicle's Enough is Enough campaign when it launched in March, said: 'It is making a difference, one brick at a time. We want to show that graffiti is something the community won't tolerate.
