Working hard to keep town graffiti-free

Inspirational group nominated

AN INSPIRATIONAL community group whose members have personally scrubbed off more than 300 graffiti tags has been nominated for a *Pride of Reading* award.

The Bell Tower Community Association has been put forward in the Environmental Project category for working "tirelessly" in its community since forming two years ago.

Chris Bloomfield, community projects manager at Reading Borough Council, nominated the group because they "roll up their sleeves" and "do the job themselves" without council assistance whenever they can.

Mr Bloomfield said: "The group impresses me because they work tirelessly for their local community."

"For example, members have gone out and physically scrubbed graffiti from walls, cleared litter and tended to the general maintenance of roads – before the council has time to act."

"That is not to say that they do not expect the council's help for this type of thing."

"They will ask us 'what can we do?' and whenever possible they will get out there and fix the community's problems themselves."

"They're a really inspirational group." He added: "They also have a wonderful website that is both informative and user-friendly."

"They had help from myself and the council to get started, but since the launch in 2005 they have very much been a self-sustaining group."

"I would also like to bring attention to their monthly newsletter, which is distributed to 550 households within their area and is well presented and extremely informative."

Teresa Colliass, who chairs the Bell Tower Community Association, told the *Post* the group feels privileged to have been nominated for the award and members are grateful all their hard work has been recognised.

She said: "We have worked extremely hard within our neighbourhood, and although it has been done by members of Bell Tower Community Association, we would not have been able to get our feet off the ground without the help of the council."

The Bell Tower Community Association, which is based in Newport Road, serves Caversham Road, Northfield Road, Barry Place, the residential end of Cardiff Road and Randolph Road.
