**Bell Tower Community Association Holds Central Reading's Biggest Street Party** 

The Bell Tower Community Association together with the residents of Newport Road held central

Reading's largest street party for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee on Saturday 2nd June.

Over 200 locals from all over the Caversham Road area brought food and drink to share with their

neighbours. Another neighbour, the Moderation pub in Caversham Road, offered a barbecue

serving the pub's signature oriental dishes as well as traditional fare and did a brisk trade, serving

over 150 dishes during the afternoon. Also adding spice to the party was the local Standard

Tandoori restaurant which donated three platters of food.

The party attracted revellers of all ages, from young children to the area's oldest resident, who

recently celebrated his 97th birthday and entered two cakes for the cake-making competition.

For the children there were craft tables, face-painting and a crown making competition. But it was

not all about dexterity, as residents also had a chance to show their knowledge in a fun Jubilee

quiz. The afternoon ended with a mini-Olympics, including the traditional egg-and-spoon race

with heats for children and adults.

Bell Tower chairman and street party organiser David Neale said: "The party far exceeded our best

expectations. We were hoping for a turnout of at least 50, and were absolutely delighted with the

attendance. So many neighbours had the chance to meet each other, often for the first time. Our

thanks go to the Moderation pub and the residents of Newport Road for helping with the

organisation of the party and supporting us so enthusiastically on the day."
